Riverside Transit Agency

What does your Board do?

The Riverside Transit Agency (RTA) board is comprised of 22 elected officials from 18 cities in western Riverside County and four members of the County Board of Supervisors. The diverse perspectives of the board members guide the activities and future initiatives of the RTA. The board members, whose interests include the expansion and continuous improvement of an efficient and effective transportation system, represent the transit interests of the cities of Banning, Beaumont, Calimesa, Canyon Lake, Corona, Eastvale, Hemet, Jurupa Valley, Lake Elsinore, Moreno Valley, Menifee, Murrieta, Norco, Perris, Riverside, San Jacinto, Temecula, Wildomar and the unincorporated areas of Riverside County Supervisorial Districts I, II, III and IV.



Board members are committed to meeting the member community transportation needs in a cost-effective and efficient manner as well as providing safe, reliable, courteous, accessible, and user-friendly services. The board works to strengthen the planning, and wise investment of physical, economic and human resources of the RTA.

What interested you in serving on the Board?

As a person who has experienced firsthand the advantages and benefits of using public transportation as a youth going to school and later in life for business, vacation, and recreation trips, I understand the role and impact of transportation services on the quality of life of community residents. Supervisor Success Stories



Each month this column will highlight recent successes in Supervisor Jeffries' Office, whether it is assistance for a single citizen dealing with the county bureaucracy, a change in county policy to improve our community, or a promise kept by the Supervisor.

Wee Tole-U-Sew

Mr. & Mrs. Cosma Stamis run a small, home-based embroidery business out of their Mead Valley home. Operating out of their home keeps their operating costs down and allows them the flexibility to work the hours they choose without the unwanted intrusions of the government. That ended in 2009, when the State and Federal governments passed along another unfunded mandate to the County of Riverside: The National Pollution Discharge Elimination System or NPDES. The Board of Supervisors, like so many other municipal governments, had to find a way to inspect every business that existed in their jurisdiction and investigate them for possible contaminated water run-off.

That led to the County's Business Registration process, wherein a business must register with the County, pay a fee, and then receive an inspection. The family complied, and a 2009 inspection showed them to be in compliance and not a threat to contaminate the waters of the United States.

However, as so often happens in large organizations, somewhere the process went awry and the Stamis family received a notice in 2013 that they were considered a High Priority Polluter, and required another inspection along with a sizable fee!

Cosma Stamis contacted Supervisor Jeffries' office and after a little research, and helpful cooperation from the Transportation and Land Management Agency's Environmental Compliance Division, the erroneous charges and need for repeated inspections was eliminated...permanently!

7 Years Later....

For those who live in or pass through Mead Valley, the Midway Jr. Market has been a staple in the community, and one of the few places to shop in this "economically challenged" community. Shade Awad, the owner of the market, has always given back to the community via fundraisers and public functions.

Seven years ago, Shade looked to give back to the community yet again, by improving the market with a new facade, a new, safer parking lot and better street access

in and out from the market, which would help the visual appearance of the market from the road, as well as make it safer. Unfortunately, that process got bogged down in a sea of county red tape, unexplained delays, and costly fees which amounted to over \$160,000.00 between all parties involved.

Frustrated and about to throw in the towel, Mr. Awad approached our office and asked for assistance to help him complete the approval process. Our office pulled together representatives of all the involved agencies to explain how this process had gotten so far off track, and with the leadership of the Director of the Transportation and Land Management Agency, a pathway to success was identified. On March 25th 2014, after seven years of waiting, the Midway Jr. Market was given its final approval at the Board of Supervisors, and the residents of Mead Valley will soon be able to enjoy a safer and more pleasant shopping experience.

Steele Peak Shooting Area Clean-Up this Saturday!

The Steele Peak Shooting Area in Good Hope is one of the last free, public shooting areas in the region. Unfortunately, irresponsible shooters and illegal dumpers have damaged and littered the area to the point where the Bureau of Land Management is considering closing the area. This Saturday, March 29th, from 8am until noon, Cal Guns has organized a volunteer clean-up day so that people can help restore the area and eliminate some of the hazards that have been left behind. This is not an official county sanctioned event, but we will be working with Cal Guns and other organizations in the future to help clean and maintain the area. If this area is closed, it will almost certainly result in more illegal shooting dispersed around the county in less safe environments, so Supervisor Jeffries supports efforts by responsible gun owners and other community members to keep this area safe, clean, and open.

Directions to the Shooting Area (from the BLM website): "There is a shooting location near the Steele Peak area of Meadowbrook/Perris north of Highway 74. Access to the area of Steele Peak is off the Santa Rosa Mine Road, off Christmas Tree Lane. As you go up Santa Rosa Mine Road, turn left onto Christmas Tree Lane, a narrow paved road that goes out to a Rod and Gun Club (privately owned). The Rod and Gun Club is on the left; as you drive out the road there will also be a large nursery on the right side of the road. Christmas Tree Lane goes out to a right-hand turn where the pavement ends. Before the right-hand turn, there is a dirt road which goes off to the left. Go up the hill to the shooting area, which you will see as you traverse the road. This shooting area is heavily used by a lot of people, so don't be surprised if someone is using it. Please be responsible with your targets and expended shells. Clean up after yourself and leave the area a little nicer than you found it!"


