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Kevin's Corner

Having now served 2 years and 4 months on the job as your County Supervisor I'm frequently asked what are we working on? So here is an abbreviated version of <u>just a</u> handful of items:

Trails: 1) A public trail all the way from Corona through the Temescal Valley, Lake Elsinore, Wildomar and ultimately into Murrieta and Temecula, 2) Working with Riverside City to enhance trails and access to the trails along Box Springs Mountain.

Community Centers & Parks: 1) Park expansion and improvements at the Good Hope Community Center, 2) Additional programs at the Mead Valley center, 3) Rehabilitate the former Butterfield Elementary school as a new community center in Lakeland Village, 4) evaluate a possible new cooperative park site with the City of Riverside that would serve portions of Woodcrest, Mead Valley and Orange Crest.

Roads: 1) Continue efforts to pave unincorporated community dirt roads that are in disrepair but can be reasonably improved (and cost efficient), with first priority on roads that serve numerous homes with little opportunity for future development, 2) Utilizing new fee revenues generated from the landfill in the Temescal Valley to make improvements to Temescal Valley Road, 3) Signage and road safety improvements to Cajalco Rd. through Mead Valley and Lake Mathews, as an interim step before the new widening project begins, 4) Study the feasibility of extending Ethanac Rd. from Menifee up to Highway 74 in Meadowbrook/Good Hope, 5) Construction of Street "A" serving the unincorporated La Sierra Hills area along the border with the City of Riverside, 6) Utilize developer funding to help pave Nandina Street down to the freeway near the industrial center in Mead Valley, 7) Improvements to Grand Ave. in Lakeland Village and portions in the City of Wildomar and City of Lake Elsinore, 8) Transfer ownership of Hwy-74 between Lake Elsinore and Perris to the County from the State, to expedite safety enhancements and job creation in the corridor, 9) Develop secondary emergency fire escape routes for several rural communities.

Public Safety: 1) Evaluate the possibility of placing a Fire Crew conservation camp at the former Los Pinos boys camp along the Cleveland National Forest, 2) Funding and implementation of body cameras for all our sheriff deputies, 3) Removing drug cartels that are operating hundreds, if not thousands, of illegal marijuna grow sites in residential communities, while adopting new regulations that acknowledge the use and limited growing for medical marijuana patients, 4) Continue increasing sheriff deputy patrol staffing (funding), while looking for new efficiencies and service delivery methods to help control the rapidly escalating costs of all public safety services for the county and contracting cities.

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Development: 1) Improve public notification of proposed land use changes, 2) Require existing cell towers to be properly maintained and graffiti free and new tower sites to blend in with the community (and not be the ugly metal towers that the County actually installed across our county several years ago), 3) Implement drought tolerant landscape standards for all new developments, 4) Improve the building permit process for small businesses and homeowners, 5) Work with state agencies and legislators to obtain a fair share of available funding to add or improve bus stops (so that RTA buses can actually pull off the road), add sidewalks, improve crosswalk safety and assist low income/disadvantaged communities with basic infrastructure improvements.

Again, this is just a <u>small percentage</u> of the items and issues we are working on daily in our office. We always welcome input from the residents of the First District--the actual taxpayers who are helping fund many of these government services!

What does my board do?

The Assessment Appeals Board is comprised of five boards consisting of three board members with two alternate members. Assessment Appeals Board members hear appeals on the assessment of property value by the Assessor. The Board hears testimony, reviews documents submitted in support of the valuation appeal and deliberates to render an unbiased professional decision as to the cash equivalent value of a property appeal, to lower upon application, or to increase after giving notice, to review, equalize and adjust assessments on the local roll, to direct the Assessor of necessary changes.



What interested you in serving on the board?

I have been a real property appraiser for twenty three years this September. The last eight years of my career as an appraiser have included a focus on litigation appraisal work, at times requiring expert witness testimony. I feel my appraisal and litigation experience to be a valuable asset to serving on the Assessment Appeals Board #4, not to mention the opportunity to expand my level of experience and to be of service to my community. Animals Services Updates Website....

If you have ever lost a dog or found someone else's dog one of the first things you want to do is reach out to the Riverside County Department of Animal Services. But until recently their 24 hour phone number and e-mail address were difficult to locate on their website. Last month, at the request of Supervisor Jeffries, the Home page was updated to include the Department's phone number and an e-mail link for quick and easy access, making it less stressful to connect with the professionals when you find yourself in need of their services.



Safety Improved in Good Hope....

At the request of several local residents to investigate a blind intersection for cars crossing Club Drive, it was recently determined there was indeed a need to install a STOP sign to help improve the safety of cars traveling north and southbound on Spring Street. The addition of this new four way stop will slow cars down along Club Drive and allow for north/south bound traffic to safely cross knowing that east/west bound traffic will now have to stop as well.

Local residents were happy to see the new stop and hope it will make the intersection safer for everyone in the community.



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The Riverside County Youth Commission hosted its annual Youth Summit on Thursday, March 19th at the Desert Princess Palm Springs Golf Resort in Cathedral City. This year, the topics of the Summit included Driver's Safety, Tolerance, and Self Defense. In addition to this, one of the original Freedom Writers, Melvin Logan came to speak to the crowd of over 500 teens in regards to overcoming the obstacles he faced while living in a rough neighborhood of Long Beach. With the generous support of the Board of Supervisors, each student received a signed copy of "The Freedom Writers Diary".

Three workshops were presented at the Youth Summit. The Driver's Safety workshop was presented by Impact Teen Drivers, which told an emotional and powerful story about a group of young teens involved in a fatal car accident. The other workshop, Tolerance, was presented by Matthew Boger from the Museum of Tolerance. His story was equally powerful depicting his story about a hate crime that turned into forgiveness and friendship. The Self Defense workshop was presented by Mika Moulton, who is the founder of Christopher's Clubhouse. She taught teens how to fight back in a life or death situation. Overall, the Youth Summit impacted the lives of the many teens that attended the event. The Riverside County Youth Commission looks forward to hosting its next Youth Summit and plans to see new and exciting changes for next year.

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
Non Profit Spotlight Spanish Town Heritage Foundation
