#### Kevin's Corner

At the end of this month I will have served three (3) years as your First District Supervisor. With roughly 450,000 residents in the First District and nearly 115,000 of those residents living outside of city boundaries - it has once again been a busy year for the First District office. Some quick highlights of 2015 accomplishments and efforts include:

- 1. Creation of the Temescal Valley Road Improvement Program, with partial funding coming from the El Sobrante Landfill.
- 2. Redirected and restored partial funding to Vector Control services to help fight the spread of West Nile Virus (and others).
- Advocated for and provided Live Video Access to County Commissions and Boards, including Planning Commission and Riverside County Transportation Commission, so the public could have more convenient access to their government.
- 4. Major Improvements to the Park at the Moses-Schaffer Community Center in Good Hope.
- 5. Established the Mead Valley Community Revitalization Initiative so that a portion of local tax revenues will be captured and re-invested back into the growing community.
- 6. Requiring on site postings of public notices for large development projects, to better inform the neighbors of proposed projects.
- 7. Purchased a former elementary school to be used as a future community center in Lakeland Village.
- 8. Creation of the multi-agency Flood Task Force to prepare for El Nino.
- Worked with two local water districts and the State to bring a safe and reliable water supply to a poor community whose water company had failed between Menifee and Wildomar.

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10. Worked with Assemblywoman Melendez to pass legislation allowing the County to eventually take over management of the portion of State Hwy 74 between Perris and Lake Elsinore.

- 11. Passed a new Marijuana Ordinance that protects legitimate small scale medical marijuana growers while cracking down on large illegal commercial grow operations in neighborhoods.
- 12. Continued emphasis and funding to pave rural roads so that emergency vehicles have year round all-weather access into our growing rural communities.
- 13. Supported external audits to insure that our tax dollars are being efficiently spent to meet the growing budget demands of public safety services.
- 14. Working with the City of Riverside and County Parks to enhance public access to Trails, and continued advocacy for the proposed Butterfield Trail from Corona to Lake Elsinore.

#### Riverside County Flood Control Commissioner

What does your commission do?

Riverside County Flood Control holds a public hearing early each year where the Flood Control Commissioners receive requests from the public and from representatives of various cities in Riverside County for flood control and water conservation projects. New requests are presented and discussed and we are updated on the progress of projects already within the budget. The Commission requests Flood Control staff to research, review and cost out any new projects that the commission feels would be beneficial to add to the budget. Approximately three months later a meeting is held where a detailed review of the entire Flood Control budget occurs. After that meeting, the budget is presented to the Board of Supervisors for approval. Another one of our Commission jobs is to take input from residents within our zones about flood issues they may know about or be experiencing, so we can pass this information on to Flood Control staff. Supervisor Jeffries recently held a special meeting with his appointed Commissioners requesting that we actively seek input from residents to better prepare for the upcoming El Nino storm season. I am attending local association meetings to let residents know the process and how to contact me.

#### What interested you in serving on the commission?

1993 El Nino Flooding directly impacted my family, home and property when 7 square miles of drainage from the local hills ended up on our property. Large trees were falling because the ground was so saturated. Rushing water and sediment ran through the property, threatening our home, animals and carving new pathways on our land. This scary experience of many sleepless nights sandbagging to protect ourselves along with the help of emergency County crews brought awareness of flooding issues to a much more personal level. In researching how to deal with and alleviate the problem, I met with my geologist brother, Flood Control, the supervisor and other County officials to determine what the issue was and where the flood waters originated. I was told about the process of presenting a flooding issue at the yearly public hearing and showed up with the photos and stories of the dangers created by the flood waters in our neighborhood. Many homes in our area were impacted as the flooding and sediment made deep pathways through several properties upstream. Within about a year, one of the Flood Control commissioners resigned and I was asked by the supervisor to join the commission. My own experience had peaked my interest in helping others through this process and I've worked to support this process over my 20+ years on the Commission.

Voices for Children transforms the lives of abused children by providing them with volunteer Court Appointed Special Advocates (CASAs). Every child deserves a safe and permanent home, and to that end, Voices for Children reviews and monitors every court file in the system, with the goal of providing a CASA to every child in the foster care system who needs one, and advocating to improve the lives of foster children. The CASA's role is to consider what is in the child's best interest and to make sure that each child's individual needs are met.

In addition, Voices for Children increases awareness about the foster care system, and advocates for legal policies and practices that enhance the quality of life for foster children.
