Kevin's Corner

While Rome is burning, the most heated debate inside the Board Room a few weeks ago was not about the \$40 million (& growing) hole in our county budget, or the uptick in crimes in many communities, but instead it was an agenda item that proposed to direct a private restaurant operator to change the food menu at the County Administrative Center (CAC) in downtown Riverside.

In fairness to my colleagues, I was the only one that thought it was a questionable topic, and I pulled it from the agenda, so I guess I bear some of the responsibility for that debate. But in an era of creeping government involvement, and nanny-like dictates from "those who know better" about what we should eat, drink, and drive, I'm uncomfortable with anything that brings the finger-wagging hand of government further into our personal lives.

If you've not been in the CAC, there is a somewhat small, privately run restaurant in the main lobby known as The Atrium. They have a decent variety of food, with daily rotating specials, and is staffed by private sector employees who spend the day dealing with hungry county employees and citizens who always seem to be in a hurry.

The main purpose of the agenda item was to extend their contract, change the menu board, add a new point of sale (POS) system that would allow for tracking, and direct the business owner to make some changes to his menu choices. For me the POS "tracking" and the directive to change the menu raised some serious red flags.

Now I'm the first to admit that my idea of a healthy meal (Italian pasta) would not make the politically correct healthy list, however when government <u>directs</u> a private business to change its menu to include certain government approved food groups and ingredients – it really smacks of Big Brother. The other initially harmless sounding item - the "POS system" indicated it would "interact with County employee database for Healthy Dining options and tracking points."

As for the menu change, if customers were actually asking for more healthy items, any smart restaurant owner who thought they could make more money selling healthy items, would already be offering them! Sure, everyone always tells the survey taker (especially a survey being circulated to county employees by the county HR department) that they want to eat healthier, but when presented with the choice between tasteless cardboard or a bacon cheeseburger, many choose the cheeseburger! And that should be our right (even if it's wrong). Forcing a restaurant owner to clear shelf and refrigerator space and feature more government-selected choices will actually result in fewer choices for the customers that actually want food that tastes good, and will also likely result in more unsold government-selected food being thrown out.

The second item (POS system) is what really got me going. The last thing Riverside County employees need is some Orwellian, Big Brother (or Big Mommy?) boss looking over their shoulder to see whether they are eating healthy enough, by linking (read: use county ID cards to order and track) their cafeteria purchases to their HR profile!

In the discussion, everyone assured me that they never had any intention of actually tracking employee meals, and it was agreed to pull that portion out of the new contract, but the healthy ingredients requirement stayed in place on a 4-1 vote. In closing, as opposed and uncomfortable as I am with government telling a private restaurant what to sell, this business is indeed operating rent free in a county owned building (so that it can afford to stay open). So does that give government officials the right to dictate what will be on the menu?

CERT is a positive and realistic approach to emergency and disaster situations where citizens will be initially on their own and their actions can make a difference. Through training, citizens can manage utilities and put out small fires; treat the three killers by opening airways, controlling bleeding, and treating for shock; provide basic medical aid; search for and rescue victims safely; and organize themselves and spontaneous volunteers to be effective.

CERT training is a commitment of 20 hours of training. There is no cost for the training. Only those who successfully complete the practical exercise with hands-on instruction in fire suppression, search and rescue, cribbing and medical will receive a certificate of completion.
