With 20,000 employees, sometimes an otherwise good employee screws up badly and an injured victim deserves compensation. Other times, our bureaucratic institutions fail to protect the very young or the elderly, something falls through the cracks and terrible things happen to the innocent at the hands of very evil people. Then there are times, you simply cannot believe that the taxpayers are being sued simply because it's California and anybody with deep pockets is fair game. Regardless, the money (millions upon millions of dollars each year) being paid out is your hard-earned tax dollars that should instead be helping to provide you with vital services. You deserve some accountability as to the causes and the corrections, and I will continue to push for that.

Mystery Meat with Bathtub Cheese? Pretty much any day of the week, you can drive through some of our rural communities and find a number of roadside food vendors operating from the back of pickup trucks and cars. Some even go to the trouble of setting up tents, tables, lighting and chairs. What most of them don't do is obtain permits and inspections from the health department to make sure the food you are eating is cooked, still hot (or frozen) and safe for humans. If you are a brick and mortar restaurant or a licensed food truck that plays by the all rules, you are inspected regularly, and these overnight, uninspected black market mystery meat wagons undermine your ability to stay in business. The county's Department of Environmental Health that inspects all the legitimate businesses is now conducting surprise inspections, citations (and some seizures) of the fly-by-night operators. So while some of you may not want to know where that package of mystery meat came from, or think bathtub cheese or home-brewed alcohol sold out of someone's trunk is a good idea, do a little favor for the legitimate businessman and woman who work every day to provide you with a safe meal, and next time you see a road side vendor (with no posted permits) operating from his/her personal vehicle, please just keep driving. Your stomach will thank you later.

Baptism by Fire. Our new Riverside County/CAL FIRE Chief Shawn Newman received a very warm but ugly welcome last month! Within a week or so of taking the new job, the 22,000 acre Holy Fire rolled out from the Cleveland National Forest and into Riverside County. Over 170 fire engines, 35 hand crews, 18 helicopters, 6 air tankers, 14 water tenders and 23 bulldozers for total of 1,568 people called into action, and as many as 20,000 1st District residents along Ortega Highway, in the Temescal Valley, and the Lake Elsinore area were under evacuation orders. Now that's a welcome party I'd prefer never to see again. P.S: Now the Chief gets to worry about the flood dangers to those who live at the bottom of those burned out canyons this coming winter.

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Homeless Guru. Your county's new Director of Homeless Solutions Natalie Komuro has jumped in with both feet. Natalie has been lining up meetings with numerous department heads, community based organizations, and city officials. The severe shortage of affordable housing (for working families and those wanting to get back on their feet), combined with extremely expensive health care services, including those to help overcome mental health issues or drug addiction issues, and the need for job training, all make Natalie's job one of the toughest in the County of Riverside. That doesn't even include the homeless who don't want any help and prefer to stay on the street, living a life of addiction, petty crime, and/or mental illness. Good luck, Natalie!

Concerned about avoiding a Montecito-like flood and debris disaster in Riverside County, Supervisor Kevin Jeffries convened a meeting with over 30 representatives from Flood Control, Fire, Sheriff, Emergency Management Department, Transportation, the City of Lake Elsinore, and others to discuss plans for evaluation, identification, mitigation, evacuations, and response to potential flood events in the canyons below the burn areas of Lake Elsinore, Temescal Valley, and Idyllwild. After we get more specific mapping and evaluations from the Forest Service and Flood Control, we will hold a series of meetings in these communities to educate residents on what to expect and how to prepare.

The I-15 Express Lanes project is underway!

The Riverside County Transportation Commission (RCTC) is constructing two new Express Lanes to I-15 in both directions, from Cajalco Road to State Route 60, widen bridges and add sound walls. This project is being built within the existing median. RCTC is also preparing to build the 15/91 Express Lanes Connector, which will link the future southbound 15 Express Lanes to the westbound 91 Express Lanes and link the eastbound 91 Express Lanes to the future northbound 15 Express Lanes. The new 15 Express Lanes are expected to open in 2020, and the 15/91 Express Lanes Connector will open by 2022. Once those were installed the County worked with Caltrans District 8 to move forward with restriping of both under crossings. Now complete, the restriping provides an additional lane for vehicles to move under I-15 and/or access the freeway.

The Digital Divide Impacts Riverside County:

Life in Riverside County is rich and rewarding for most of its 2.4 million residents! We enjoy easy access to mountains, desert and the ocean. We can shop for nearly anything we desire, attend cultural events, world class music festivals like Coachella and Stagecoach Festival, tour our high quality local wine region in Temecula, and are close to both beaches and mountains. Our average family income is over \$58,000 per year, with 27% of our families earning over \$100,000.

But wait . . . That rosy picture does not extend everywhere. Consider the following:

- 20% of all households are single-parent families
- 20% of all adults do not have a high school diploma or equivalent
- 11% of our population is disabled
- 13% of the population is 65 years and older
- 15% speak English less than proficiently

Acceptable Items

- <u>Tires</u>: Per state law, please only transport 9 tires per trip. Please call Riverside County Waste Management Department for a waiver if needed. Tires must be less than 4ft in diameter & weigh less than 200 lbs.
- <u>Furniture</u>: Sofa beds, couches, tables, chairs, mattresses, box springs and patio furniture.
- Large Appliances: Washing machines, dryers, stoves refrigerators, water heaters, air conditioners and dishwashers.
- <u>Tree Limbs and Branches:</u> Should not exceed 18 inches in diameter or 3 feet in length. Please make sure tree limbs are bundled and tied together.
- <u>Electronic Waste (E-Waste)</u>: Computers, monitors, printers, old televisions and other electronic devices with a plug or circuit board.
- Other Items: Bicycles, barbecues, swing sets, and small appliances

Unacceptable Items

- Fluorescent light bulbs
- Pesticides/Fertilizers
- Weed Killers/Herbicides
- Rodent Poisons
- Latex, Oil, or Water based Paint
- Batteries,
- Motor Parts
- Solvents/Gasoline
- Transmission/brake fluid
- Bleach/tub & Tile Cleaners
- Empty Drums
- Anti-Freeze
- Pool Chemicals
- Engines
- Motor oil and Other Hazardous
- Concrete or construction/ demolition materials
