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Kevin's Corner

Big Boxes or a Big Crazy Idea? Located between Van Buren and Alessandro, west of the 215, is hundreds of acres of vacant land that was formerly a part of the March Air Force properties and turned over to the March Joint Powers Authority (JPA) for economic development and job creation. This site is really that last big chunk of vacant land within the JPA and it is now targeted for mega warehouse developments. But with the future of warehouses looking more and more automated, will most of the jobs they promise be limited to the drivers of tractor-trailer rigs stuck on our congested freeways and roadways? At the risk of being told I am off my rocker, I can't help but wonder... is Western Riverside County ready and able to plan and build a truly mega multi-use park instead? A park of such a scale would require significant revenues to build, and then ongoing funding obligations to maintain. Perhaps a crazy concept that combines some business economic opportunities with the big park ideas? And now back to reality...

Public Hearings/Money Meetings — With the federal government handing out lots of money to counties and cities, topped off with strong jumps in local revenues (thank you home sellers, workers, and private businesses for keeping people working), your county government might actually enjoy its first truly balanced budget in nearly a dozen or more years (if we electeds don't screw that up). If you want to offer some budgeting suggestions, feel free to attend the budget hearing on June 13th and possibly June 14th. New Masters of Transportation? In a surprising development, there are several bills in the state legislature that would severely limit, or in some communities, completely strip away the authority of counties and/or cities to work together to locally fund and work with state and/or federal transportation authorities to build or widen critically needed transportation corridors. The general theory of the three bills (AB 2438, AB 2237 & AB 1778) is that if new capacity (e.g., widening) is added to our major roadways, which will result in more people using those improved roads, which then in turn could or would harm our climate. This would then conflict with the State climate goals, and as such would be automatically denied. This would even apply to proposed projects that we taxpayers specifically authorized via a tax vote for transportation improvements (e.g., SB-1 & Measure-A sales tax). I am NOT a fan of having the State take away local control and our ability to improve capacity on our corridors, particularly while the State is MANDATING that our county (& our cities) add 167,351 more affordable homes/ dwellings in our county (on top of the already occurring growth of overpriced housing and commercial operations). In my humble opinion there are plenty of good reasons for us to prevent our county from becoming a concrete jungle of Los Angeles-like rooftops and pavement. However, whether you drive a gas or electric vehicle, we all depend on our roads to get to and from work, family outings, vacations, shopping, etc., (and most of us will never see high-speed rail reach the

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Inland Empire). Handing over these important quality of life decisions to the State (for them to automatically reject) just doesn't make any sense to me.

A New Face – for those of you who follow planning and development issues in unincorporated Riverside County, local resident and well-known Mead Valley grocery store businessman Mr. Shade Awad has been appointed to represent the First District on the Riverside County Planning Commission. Mr. Awad replaced Commissioner Bruce Schaffer, who is taking a well-deserved retirement from the position. Thank you to Bruce and Shade.

We Need Smart Reforms – We've had a recent wave of home invasions, local store owners are already up to their eyeballs with thieves walking out the front door with under \$950 worth of stolen merchandise, and residents are dealing vandals cleaning-out homes and/or parked cars, and the severely mentally-ill have nearly free rein to do what they want. Lost among the headlines about previous criminal justice reforms (Props 47 and 57 and AB 109) that have made it increasingly difficult to lock up bad guys for anything except violent crimes is the fact that the State simultaneously went even further in the area of juvenile justice reform. Our state no longer allows local authorities to differentiate between troubled juveniles who simply need intervention, mentorship, and guidance from those who have literally become hardened, perhaps even brutal criminals. Juvenile halls and mandatory treatment or detention facilities are all but gone across our state and are being replaced with residential foster care homes that have little ability to prevent walk-offs or violence against neighbors or staff. To be fair, it is important to note that nearly all studies indicate that many of our troubled youth do in fact benefit from a non-incarceration approach that utilizes wrap-around services to help them. The downside of course is that the current one size fits all approach by state regulations does not provide for exceptions when dealing with truly hardened lost souls who have little respect for life. On the adult side, the State is once again evaluating closing up a number of state prisons. Our county jails are pretty much full, affordable housing has extremely long waiting lists for families, so exactly where are they going to go?

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
Non Profit Spotlight

Voices for Children is the only local organization approved by the court to match each child with a volunteer, called a Court Appointed Special Advocate (or CASA), who gets to know their situation and makes sure their needs are being met. Due to the current crisis, children need CASAs more than ever. A CASA often becomes the only consistent person in the child's life. At regular court hearings required for all children in foster care, our CASAs report on the children's progress and needs, which is essential for judges to make the best decisions for their futures.

FREE CALIFORNIA STATE PARK PASSES NOW AVAILABLE AT RIVERSIDE COUNTY LIBRARY BRANCHES

Through a partnership among California State Parks and the California State Library, any Riverside County resident, with an active RCLS card in good standing, may borrow a park pass.

The passes may be checked out for two weeks and are available from every branch including the library connect mobile resource vans.

The passes will be checked out on a first-come, first-serve basis and cannot be renewed or placed on hold.

The passes allow entry for one passenger vehicle with nine people or fewer or one Highway licensed motorcycle, at participating state park units.

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Workforce Development Services Available to Riverside County Residents and Employers


Resources are available to help Riverside County residents transition back to work and to address the labor force needs of Riverside County employers. Riverside County Workforce Development provides federally funded career and employment assistance at no cost to our job seeking and employer customers.

Residents who have been laid off, are long-term unemployed, or low income can access a wide array of assistance. Workforce Development Services include free use of computer resource rooms, help creating or updating a resume, one-on-one career coaching, assessments, employment preparation workshops, job search assistance, interviewing skills, and job fairs. Eligible participants may also receive up to \$8,000 in assistance for employment skills training and a laptop computer. These no-cost services help residents re-enter the workforce and find a new career.

Riverside County employers can access services to help fill open positions and train their labor force. Workforce Development provides recruitment services, applicant pre-screening, virtual or in-person hiring events, a free human resources hotline, and labor market information. To offset costs of hiring and on-boarding, eligible employers may also qualify to be reimbursed for up to 50% of an eligible new employee's wages for the first 480 hours of employment. These federally funded services support the growth and resilience of employers in the County.





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Although most drownings occur each year during the summer, drownings can happen at any time of the year to people of all ages – in bodies of water as big as the ocean or as small as a bucket.

"The real tragedy of drowning is that it is 100 percent preventable, just by taking some simple steps whenever you or a loved one is around water," said Dr. Geoffrey Leung, public health officer for Riverside County.

The Riverside County Water Safety Coalition is offering the following water safety tips:

- If you own a pool, install a fence around it, use safety covers and think about installing alarms or motion detectors near the pool gate. Gates should close on their own and open away from the pool.
- Enroll children in survival swimming lessons and have them wear appropriate life jackets.
 Floaties are not enough to keep children from drowning.
- Get trained in CPR, basic first aid and rescue methods.
- Finally, adults who are in or near water should avoid consuming alcohol and medications that can influence judgment, balance and the ability to swim.
- In 2022, there have been five accidental adult drownings and zero accidental child drownings in Riverside County.
